## **NEW PLEIADES!**

The new Vision 2020 Capital Campaign sets a path for the Rocky Mountain Ministry for the next 8 years! While bold and challenging, it comes out of a desire to fulfill the mission statement of the camp in providing a place of retreat which



encourges holistic Christian growth by fostering the spiritual, social, physical, and intellectual growth of each guest. The first campaign project is our biggest which replaces and combines the Pleiades and Infirmary facilities (built in the early 60's).

#### \$300K - CAMPAIGN FUNDS NEEDED FOR THE FOLLOWING IMPROVEMENTS:

- □ Two person rooms to better serve the needs of church groups, adult retreats and volunteers.
- Accessible rooms (main floor) and inside bathroom facilities near the DH/Lodge.
- Provide a comfortable and functional infirmary as required by our child care license.
- □ Add needed permanent staff housing.
- Save money with improved energy efficiency (insulation, windows, foundation, etc).
- Relocate staff lounge (now in Langnau room in DH/Lodge) for new office entrance and lounge area for all guests in DH/Lodge.

### OTHER CAMPAIGN PROJECTS

(Listed in order to be accomplished)

- \$200k Replace boys side bathhouse.
- \$160k (20k per year) Ongoing water system improvements (new wells at Eagles Nest & Park Ridge).
- \$80k Replace aging camp vehicles.
- \$20k New playground for more ages.
- \$40 Bern Dining Hall renovation (refinish walls, new windows, increase insulation).

## A WHOLE LOT OF "FUNGI" GOING ON

It was a good year for mushrooms at RMMC. We had just the right combination of daily afternoon rains and warm sunny mornings in late July to produce a beautiful array of yellow, white, brown and red mushrooms. Identifying mushrooms can be very tricky. For one thing there are just so very many of them – up to 6,000 in Colorado alone, according to one mycologist. Some are edible, many are poisonous. Some of the edibles have poisonous "look-alikes". Distinguishing the difference may involve making a spoor print

or observing the color of juices that result upon breaking and any bruising reactions. Some require more complicated chemical tests or microscopic analysis. But some are well-known enough for even we amateurs to identify, including this beautiful, poisonous, Fly Agaric. During Family Camp II, the more experienced mushroom hunter Mimzy Wellberg found a large crop of the very tasty and highly prized King Bolete. Some mushrooms have medicinal properties and oth-



ers are used in ceremonies and rituals. Mushrooms can be used for dyeing wool and other natural fibers. Some, known as tinder fungi, can be used as fire starters. Some types of mushrooms are added to garden soil to spur plant growth. Others are used in filtration technologies to lower bacterial levels in contaminated water. It is not every year that we see such a good fruiting of these beautiful and useful fungi. And when we do we're always intrigued by their presence and reminded of the wonderfully diverse natural environment here at camp.
